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As many of you know, I joined a group of other MCC/MCC Thrift folks on a Learning Tour in mid-March. I had never before visited a developing country in this capacity, and it was a beautiful, thought-inspiring experience!

We visited a number of MCC partners, each of them are working in their own way to build community, improve food security, provide education, be a good steward to the environment, and address overall well-being.

What our MCC hosts made clear is that they "walk alongside" their partners in Bolivia. They recognize that in-country NGO's know best what is needed for each unique community. MCC is there to support and offer advice when it's requested, and they follow up routinely with projects to gauge their effectiveness. I find this to be a beautiful approach, because I can understand how having a pre-packaged program used as a cookie-cutter across cultures can create a waste of funds and effort if the program doesn't address what is actually needed. You should know that your donations to MCC go towards programs that the supported communities appreciate and embrace.

One of those partners is FUBE or Fundacion Una Brisa de Esperanza (Foundation for a Breeze of Hope). FUBE serves children who are the victim of sexual violence. They have a staff that includes lawyers, psychologists, and social workers so that all aspects of a child's case and well-being can be addressed. All staff assigned to a child's case work together as a team to build a case against the perpetrator. FUBE has an impressive 95% conviction rate for its cases. They also work to educate law enforcement, prosecutors, and others in how to relate with the victims to avoid further harm and reduce further traumatization.

Psychologists work with the children and their families to support their recovery and promote healing. The focus is always on the well-being of the children and their family unit as they move through their trauma. They offer educational opportunities for the girls to learn skills such as pastry making, sewing, or nail tech, so that they can build economic independence into the future. They also host classes for financial literacy, neuroscience, and more.

The center itself is bright and cheerful, with a lush green courtyard filled with flowers and greenery of all sorts. They focus on a holistic approach to the child's wellness, including specialized therapy rooms, as well as a "fitness" room where they have fitness equipment, and also teach mind-body techniques that help tame anxiety and calm the mind. Even when a case is complete, the families served by FUBE are always welcome to come and visit this safe space. FUBE also has regular community-building activities that bring their clients together in celebration.

They have a large meeting space that has a glass wall, allowing copious amounts of sunshine into the space. We happened to visit when they were having their International Women's Day activities. There were approximately 20 families who participated. There was an informative video about important women from across the globe, craft activities, story telling, and the adults were invited to write about the most important women in their lives. No surprise, many women wrote of mothers, sisters, or grandmothers that had provided so much support and love during hard times. Several women also shared what FUBE had meant to them. As they shared their stories of healing and hope, I grew teary right along with them.

Every community should have a resource like this. Because of your support of Gift & Thrift and MCC, FUBE continues to give a voice to these Survivors in Cochabamba.
